Lake Research Partners and The Tarrance Group designed and administered this pre-election and election night omnibus survey which was conducted by phone using professional interviewers November 6-8, 2016. The questions about voting and the demographics reached a total of 2,400 likely voters nationwide who voted in the 2016 elections – 1401 interviews among voters who were reached on cell phones and 999 interviews among voters who were reached on landlines. Issue questions reached a total of 1,200 likely voters nationwide who voted in the 2016 elections (margin of error of +/-2.8%). The data were weighted to reflect the aggregated Presidential vote as reported in the 2016 exit polls, as well as by gender, age, race, party identification, education, marital status, union household, and census region to reflect the actual proportions of the electorate. The survey has a margin of error of ±2.0% at the 95% confidence interval.
